Soccer started in Frankston in 1951 BY ACCIDENT. An estate agent loaned £75 to get the club started, believing it to be a new footy club.

He was elected first club president and at the inaugural meeting, exclaimed "Why the basket ball?" when a soccer ball was put on the table.

In fact Frankston City S.C. started as an off-shoot of the British migrants club, Hearts of Oak.

Today's president and life member of the club Mr. Nippy Prior, was also a foundation member. He is known as Mr. Soccer down Frankston way.

From these modest beginnings has developed a major upsurge of Soccer in the area.

The following statistics have been supplied and verified by Mr. Norman Jones, publicity officer of Frankston City.

Within the boundaries of the City of Frankston are seven Soccer clubs comprising seven senior sides with 103 registered players and 33 junior teams with 420 registered players. These clubs are controlled by 102 officials but have only nine Soccer grounds and one under private construction.

One of the nine grounds is on land owned by the Board of Works, who charge \$10 per week to the struggl-

To house these players they have two grounds — Cranbourne Road oval for Juniors, available only on Saturday mornings, and North Seaford Reserve.

In 1963, officials from Frankston City went to the fast developing Pines Estate district and started the Frankston Pines Soccer Club.

Mr. Eddie Bardsley, present vice chairman of Frankston City, was their first coach. Pines now have 15 officials, two senior teams with 28 registered players and four junior teams with 50 junior players.

They have two grounds on Pines Estate and are at present negotiating with the city council to part pay for the erection of new clubrooms.

Growth of Soccer is so great in this area that two grounds are not enough.

The year 1964 saw the emergence of another Soccer club, Langwarrin. Although not in the city boundaries, its ground, Lawton Park, is.

The club was started by that hard working, dedicated Soccer firebrand, Ted Thornton. Local businessman Mr. Con Van Den Engel is the present chairman.

They have 12 officials, two senior teams with 30 registered players and two junior sides, also with 30 registered players.

Langwarrin are fortunate to have received considerable



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Within the boundaries of the City of Frankston are seven Soccer clubs comprising seven senior sides with 103 registered players and 33 junior teams with 420 registered players. These clubs are controlled by 102 officials but have only nine Soccer grounds and one under private construction.

One of the nine grounds is on land owned by the Board of Works, who charge \$10 per week to the struggling junior club, Peninsula S.C. No ground markings, dressing accommodation or other amenities are provided.

One of the other grounds is only available on Saturday mornings until noon. The city fathers of Frankston have, therefore, provided only SEVEN full time grounds, to accommodate 40 soccer teams.

Frankston City Council is showing great reluctance to provide urgently needed playing areas for these teams. Perhaps the officials and parents of the boys will show their disapproval at the next council elections.

Frankston City have three senior teams and 45 registered players, together with seven junior teams and 90

In 12 months, it developed to 18 officials and 90 registered boys. They still have only ONE ground at Seaford and pleas for another fall on deaf ears.

Peninsula Junior Soccer Club was also formed in 1969. Mr. Jim Cain is president and they have six junior teams with 75 registered players.

Since starting, they have re-

peatedly asked Frankston Council for a ground and been refused.

Last year they played on the old Golf Links Estate, by courtesy of the sub-divider.

They are now playing on Board of Works property, but are only permitted to erect temporary dressing accommodation.

Frankston Council erected a first class dressing room, with many amenities at North Seaford Reserve which Frankston City shares with Seaford United, but nothing has been erected at Karingal, Langwarrin or Peninsula.

Actively involved with Soccer are 625 officials and players, a host of wives and girlfriends working behind the scenes, brings the total to near 1000.

On an average weekend, a minimum of 500 spectators watch the games. And there is a big migrant population in Frankston, with a loud voice.

Frankston Council would be well advised to heed it and help these youngsters to enjoy their favourite pastime, by providing much needed facilities.

The Soccer explosion is gaining momentum day by day, down Frankston way.
